- 1. Be a problem solver. Organizations are looking for individuals who know how to work a problem and find solutions without being told what to do. Employees with critical thinking skills who can act independently to solve problems are extremely valuable in today's workforce.
- 2. Be willing to question the status quo, but do so respectfully. Companies appreciate employees who can question how things are being done in a constructive way that contributes to team building without dividing people.
- 3. Always do what is in the best interest of the team. Collaboration is vitally important to the success of today's companies. They need teams within the organization that know how to work together and solve conflict with "win-win" scenarios.
- 4. Connect with the organization's mission and values. Understand why the organization exists and what it is trying to accomplish. Individuals who have a sense of entitlement are not likely to be successful in today's workplace. Instead, employees are expected to understand that they are there to add value to the company and advance its mission.
- 5. Communication. Today's successful employees know how to communicate well orally and in writing. Those preparing for a future career should take advantage of opportunities to write and make presentations in College, so they can sharpen those skills.

We brought in our three guest speakers last week because the College is dedicated to helping you develop the skills and talent you need to be successful in challenging and rewarding careers. This is the one focus that binds us all. We have thousands of students, all with distinct career goals and talents. We have hundreds of programs, each with their unique graduation requirements.
